I am sorry not to have returned the diary to you before now. The fact is that the Committee have not yet seen Gertrude EVANS as they are waiting to hear whether she wishes to be released. Last February she indicated that she was not anxious to be released and unless she has changed her mind since then I do not expect the Committee will bother to see her. If, on the other hand, they do see her, it is possible, but I think not very likely, that they may want the diary back, in which case I am afraid I will have to trouble you again.

We have no identifiable trace of the Stones and I should be glad if you could have some indirect enquiries made about these people in order to establish their background and particularly with a view to discovering why they should be friends or acquaintances of Mrs Eriksson. From our records it does not appear that Mrs Eriksson was ever employed by the Stones.

"Sir,

The above was visited this morning by Mrs. Stone & Rodney Stone, 19. Barons court Road W.14. Eriksson said she was not feeling very well and was in bed when called for the visit. She said she was very worried about her people and asked Mrs Stone to send a wire to them and say she was well and ask how they were as letters were being returned and there was no mail between the 2 countries. She also said that Heimann had promised to write to her people when she got to Switzerland and let them know she was safe and well. The rest of the conversation was about friends and recent films.

I am anxious to trace the present whereabouts of "Major Stuart-Dawson of the Dorchester Hotel" whose name was found in the note book of the German Agent *Aty* ERIKSSON.

Reference to "Who's who" shows that there is a Major Norman Gordon STEWART-DAWSON D.S.O. D.S.C. who was born in 1890 and whose permanent address is 19, Hatton Gardens E.C. (which is the address of Stewart Dawson & Co. Ltd. Goldsmiths).

Enquiry at the Dorchester showed that an individual named Stewart Stuart-Dawson, said to be the brother of Major Norman Stuart-Dawson stayed at the Dorchester from 30.12.38. - 28.1.39.

In the particulars which you kindly sent me of Stewart Dawson & Co. Limited of 19, Hatton Garden (copy attached) there is no mention of Major Norman Gordon Stewart Dawson's name, but I see that one of the directors is Stuart Stewart-Dawson, whose permanent home is in Sydney.

I was wondering if you could very kindly find out discreetly from someone in Stewart Dawson's whether Stuart Stewart Dawson was in London in December 1938 and January 1939, and what are his present whereabouts.

It seems possible that a mistake was made and that it was really Major Norman Gordon Stewart-Dawson and not his brother who was at the Dorchester from 30.12.38.- 28.1.39.

From discreet enquiry made it was ascertained that Major Norman Gordon Stewart-Dawson, who was at one time a director of the firm of STEWART DAWSON & COY LIMITED, 19, Hatton Garden, E.C., was in London in December 1938 and January 1939 and was staying at the Dorchester Hotel.

Major DAWSON who was in the Royal Air Force, died in October, 1940. He was staying at the Dorchester Hotel with his brother David and their mother who is the wife of Prince Michael ~~RADZIWILL~~ RADZIWILL.

Stuart STEWART-DAWSON whose home is in Sydney was not in London either in 1938 or 1939 and is at his home at the present time.

X The correct name of Guy le FEUVRE is Anstruther MAINGUY and he is now living at room 6.x.v., Cumberland Hotel, Marble Arch, W.1. X He has been employed in the Censorship Department, Ministry of Information, Prudential Buildings, Holborn, since August, 1939.

MAINGUY stated that he lived in Vienna for six years from 1927 until 1933 and then moved to Paris where he remained about 12 months. He then came to London and stayed with Sir Timothy and Lady Eden at their house in Hyde Park Square. Lady Eden is his niece and he spends much time in their company. He moved with them to Fritham House, Lyndhurst, in 1939 and remained there until he joined the Censorship.

He was closely questioned regarding the staff at Fritham House, but could not remember My ERIKSSON. He did point out, however, that Lady Eden had much difficulty with the staff and from time to time was almost forced to employ German girls in the absence of suitable domestics born in this country. It is possible that ERIKSSON was a member of the household whose services were used in the absence of English girls.

In the course of conversation with MAINGUY I learned that he was a drug addict for some years up to 1937 and was in fact given permission to obtain drugs by the Government in Austria and by the Home Office in this country. In 1937 he entered a nursing home in Bournemouth where he was cured but left in a very weak condition, so weak in fact that he was unable to work for many months. It was during this period that he was staying at Fritham House.

I formed the opinion that MAINGUY was anxious to assist Police so I gave him a brief outline of the nature of the enquiry. It did not help, however, and he could add nothing to what is already known about My ERIKSSON. One suggestion he made during our interview is worthy of notice. He said that the fact that he was a drug addict was well known to the Austrian authorities from whom he received an issue of drugs and to the staff at Fritham House. It was possible that his name had been handed to SIMON to check up in Vienna with a view to him being approached at a later date, if it was thought advisable by the authorities in Germany.

I am at last in a position to reply to your letter of the 23rd February 1941 (Ref. B.L./ERIKSSON [CHATEAU-THIERRY] SCHMIDT) addressed to Dick White. P.F.46990

The two photographs found amongst My ERIKSSON's property have now been identified as coming from the "SUNDAY EXPRESS" and the "SUNDAY PICTORIAL" of 2nd April 1939. The caption under which the "SUNDAY EXPRESS" photograph was published was as follows:

"Herr Hitler gives the Nazi salute as he arrives for the launching of the new 35,000 ton battle-ship "Admiral von Tirpitz" at Wilhelmshaven yesterday."

I have succeeded in obtaining an original print which you may care to see, which I enclose. I am afraid this has to be returned so I will be obliged if you would let me have it back in due course.

The photographs of Heinz RITTER upon which you recently interrogated a number of your charges with negative results, have now been put to CHATEAU-THIERRY, My ERIKSSON and Vera ERICKSEN, none of whom recognised it. They all state that it does not resemble either "DR RHEINHARDT" or RANTZAU.

When reading through the My ERIKSSON file in connection with this matter I came across the following passage in a report by B.22 on an interrogation of My ERIKSSON of the 8.4.41:

"In the course of conversation with Mrs ERIKSSON she admitted that she did send the name of the Duchess of CHATEAU THIERRY to DR RANTZAU. Amongst My ERIKSSON's papers were the two newspaper photographs which are enclosed herewith. I showed them to her and asked whether the individual marked in each with a star and in one with the word 'Moi' was DR RANTZAU. Without any hesitation she said: "No, that is Gauleiter RHEINHARDT." I also showed them to the Duchess and asked her whether

the individual in the photo was her friend RHEINHARDT; she said that he looked very like him, but that she could not be quite sure. This opens up a point which may be of interest, the Duchess has been emphatic all along that the man who interviewed her was named RHEINHARDT, and it has been generally accepted that RANTZAU may have interviewed the Duchess under that alias. It may be, however, that the man really was Gauleiter RHEINHARDT, a man of such importance in the Nazi hierarchy as to be in the close entourage of Hitler himself. It is possible that RANTZAU put up a man of RHEINHARDT's importance to interview CHATEAU-THIERRY because she was a Duchess."

If CHATEAU-THIERRY was speaking the truth when she stated that the newspaper photograph was of the RHEINHARDT whom she knew, then it would appear that there is a real RHEINHARDT, and that the name is not merely an alias of RANTZAU's - although it may well be that RANTZAU used the alias RHEINHARDT in addition to many others. On the other hand we have in our possession a letter from RANTZAU to My ERIKSSON, which appears to convey clear evidence that RANTZAU did meet CHATEAU-THIERRY in Germany. I do not ^{pretend} propose to know the answer to this conundrum, but I think that it is ~~im~~probable that CHATEAU-THIERRY is either deliberately attempting to deceive us, or else is playing the old game of attempting to get into our good books by giving us answers which she thinks will please us on matters which she is far from certain in her own mind.

It seems to me that some interesting results might be obtained if they were to spend a little time down there. I understand that special permission of Sir Alexander Maxwell would have to be obtained, but I desire to point out that now both the Duchesse and My ERIKSSON have been before Advisory Committees, who have recommended their continued detention, there is even less likelihood of their being able to tell the outside world anything about Ham. Also I believe Stephens now has facilities for women "guests".

Would you care to put forward this suggestion in the appropriate quarters, if you think it a good one?



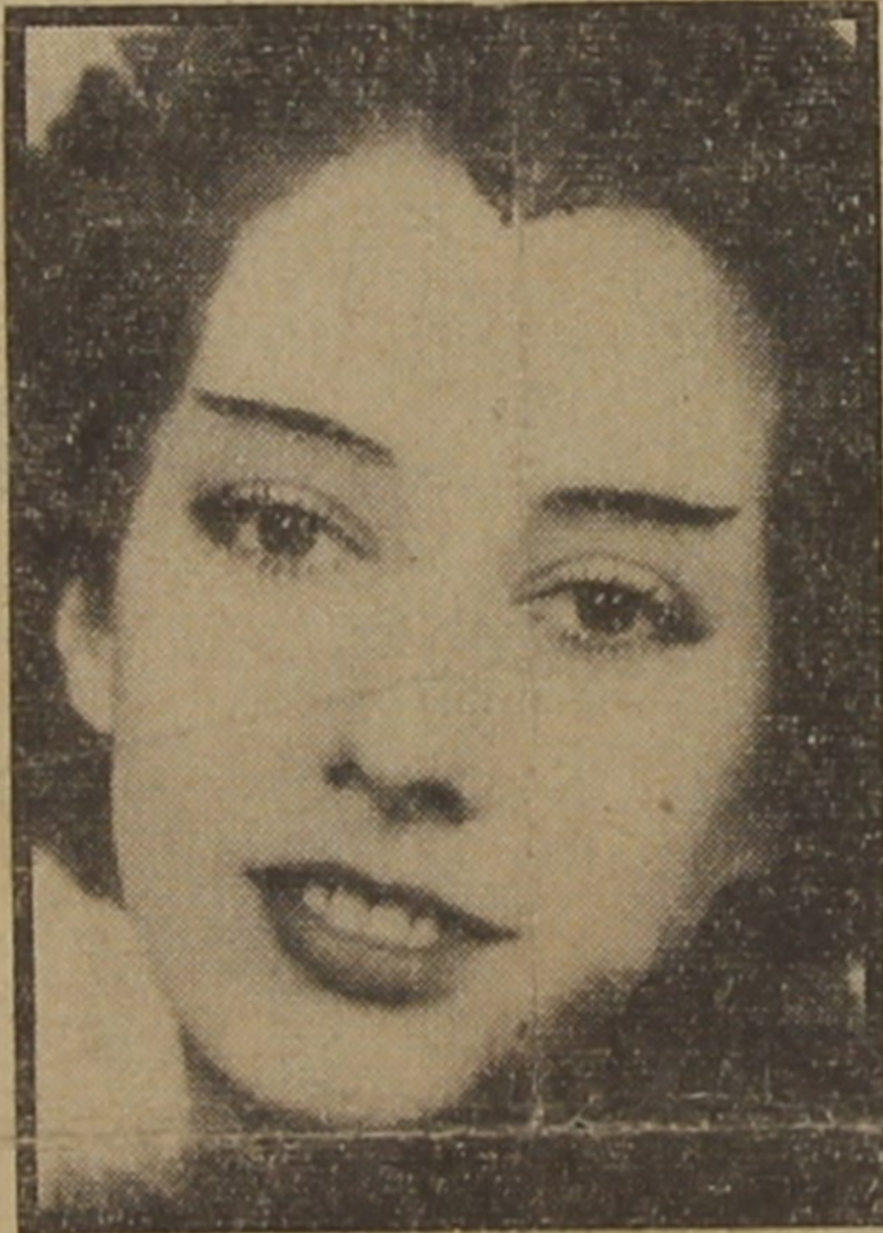

I doubt very much whether we are going to get anything further out of her, as there is no "Latchmere House for Females". A number of Germans who were detained at Holloway have been moved to internment camps and I have no doubt that the German authorities are fully aware that My ERIKSSON is held by us.

Perhaps you would be good enough to let E.3 know whether it is your view that we should still oppose the transfer of this woman from Holloway to an internment camp?

I interviewed Mr. George Reuben POLLEY, of 137, Hillside-avenue, Boreham Wood, Herts, who is general manager of British Produce Stores, 120, Wigmore-street, W.1. (Tel: Wellbeck 1191) on June 6th, 1941, regarding Mrs Eriksson.

POLLEY states that he spoke to Mrs ERIKSSON on about six occasions prior to 1938 when she was housekeeper to Lord and Lady Elveden. These occasions were when she called at the shop to place orders for groceries, and his conversation was only of a general character. On one occasion, however, he asked her why she was in this country, and he gathered from her reply that she was parted from her husband and had come to England to earn money to enable her to pay for the education of her son at some college on the Continent.

She left London about February or March 1938 to work in the household of Lord Derwent, Hackness Hall, Scarborough. Polley explains his remark "I was once able to do her a good turn" by stating that in connection with the shop a small servant agency is carried on. When customers, many of whom are wealthy and titled people, wish to obtain domestic servants, he is often able to meet their requirements; and he believes that he was instrumental in getting Mrs Eriksson her post with Lord Derwent.

Polley describes Mrs Eriksson as a pleasant and rather charming person, but emphasises that his contact with her was only across the shop counter. When Mrs Eriksson went to Scarborough she continued to deal with British Produce Stores but the account was closed on November 7th, 1939. Polley has not heard from her since.

An employee of the firm, now Corporal Jimmy James, of the R.A.F. Police, stationed at an aerodrome somewhere between Folkestone and Dover, used to deliver groceries to Mrs Eriksson and Polley suggests that he might know her better than he does.

My ERIKSSON / REINHARDT

Butler wrote to me on 21.2.41 forwarding two photographs from newspapers which were found in My ERIKSSON's property. The significant passage in the letter is the observation of the Gravesend Police, namely, "In each case the picture of Doctor REINHARDT is marked with a cross". Butler has asked me generally for observations, which are as follows:-

- (i) It should be a very simple matter to obtain original issues of the newspapers which published these photographs. In this way we will immediately get the captions, which will probably indicate the occasion and place. Furthermore the date will also be available, which seems to me a matter of primary importance.

From the reverse of the oblong photograph there are reasons to suppose that the newspaper was published on a Sunday, for the consolidated Pools results have been given. Furthermore there are indications such as the "highest score" which are familiar in Sunday papers. In any event the actual date can be ascertained by looking up the fixture West Ham v. Sheffield United which resulted in a draw of 0. all. Lastly, the layout is typical of that of a Sunday picture paper such as the Sunday Pictorial or the Sunday Graphic and any journalist of competence could soon clear the matter.

From the reverse of the rectangular photograph there is again a possibility of obtaining a relative date owing to the appearance of the Brazilian singer Olga Coelo at the Brazilian Embassy. Again, any Fleet Street journalist could identify the paper itself.

- (ii) With regard to the markings of the photographs I attach considerable importance to the word "moi" on the oblong paper, for this seems to indicate that the picture in question had been given by the man photographed, and the use of the French word is curious if not significant.
- (iii) In so far as the uniform is concerned I am relying on a pamphlet "Uniformfibel", von Geschichtsmaler Kföstel d.J." dated 1933, and on page 32 thereof there are fairly clear reproductions of cap badges and collar badges which correspond. Indeed, there seems considerable reason to suppose the uniform is that of a Reichsführer der S.S. bis Brigadeführer. In general corroboration, the photograph indicates the man stands high in the comic German hierarchy, for he is jostling close to Hitler, while both his collar and collar badge are edged with braid. Furthermore, the chinstrap is in heavy braid also. It is difficult, of course, in the blurred photograph to speak exactly of the cap badge, but the impression is that of the skull worn by the S.S. It is not a Luftwaffe badge, for that spread widely across the cap.

With regard to possible description, the following table may be found of value:-

(iv) Identification by internees in this Camp has proved abortive, either through ignorance or design. Corroboration, however, might well be extracted from Wolf SCHMIDT, and as this particular spy is wanted here in connection with the "Suspicious Square" inquiry of the Air Ministry for his temporary return would be appreciated. My suggestion in regard to Vera ERICHSEN is that Doctor Dearden should question her on the subject.

Mme Mathilde Lucie CARRE alias VICTOIRE.

I enclose a note on VICTOIRE who is the lady about whom I spoke to you the other day.

I pointed out to you then that it was essential that VICTOIRE should not be permitted to mix with the ordinary 12(5A) internees and suggested that it might be possible to arrange accommodation in a prison for VICTOIRE and two or three other women of her kidney.

It is, of course, essential that VICTOIRE should not be permitted to appeal to the Lindley Committee and that she should not be allowed to have any communication with persons who may be released before the termination of hostilities.

You told me on the telephone that you would be able to arrange suitable accommodation for VICTOIRE and a few colleagues either at Holloway or at Aylesbury. I have made enquiries from the Sections of this office who are concerned and now put forward a short tentative list of companions for VICTOIRE.

I can hardly think that any Committee would recommend her release. Mrs. KRAFFT'S continued detention was recommended without much hesitation by the Advisory Committee. The same applies to the DUCHESSE DE CHATEAU THIERRY.

I am assuming that on the information contained in my note the Home Secretary will find little difficulty in making a detention order under Article 12(5A) against VICTOIRE. If the Order is made, would you be good enough to send it to me direct and I will see to its service when the necessary arrangements have been made for the reception of VICTOIRE and her colleagues in the new accommodation.
